

Political Parties

- A <u>Political Party</u> is an organization of individuals with broad common interests who organize to win elections and influence policy.
- Ideology: A system of ideas and beliefs that forms the basis of political or economic beliefs.

Political Parties

- The U.S. is dominated by two parties: <u>Democrats</u> and <u>Republicans</u>
 - Third Parties (minor parties) run, but rarely win major elections
 - Effects of our two-party system:
 - Polarizes the population (people are far apart with their ideology)
 - Pick who is hated least
 - Influences of Third Parties:
 - Takes votes from major parties (change election results)
 - Spotlight specific issues

One Party System

- One political party is in control
 - Public has fewer rights
 - Dictatorship
 - Autocracy
 - North Korea
 - Iran

Multi-Party System

- Aka: coalition government
- Parties get same percentage of seats in Parliament as percentage of votes
 - Italy
 - France

Early American Political Parties

- Federalists v Anti-Federalists
 - Democrats v Republicans
- Founding Fathers on Political Parties:
 - Not a good idea
 - Washington: "agitates the community with ill-founded jealousies and false alarms, kindles the animosity of one part against another."

Political Parties

- A <u>Platform</u> is a set of beliefs that a political party supports
- A <u>Plank</u> is an individual part of the platform
